"If You Love Me ... "

In many cases these words can be poison if they are uttered in such a way as to force someone into submitting to another's desires. In other cases they may be uttered to question if the love is true or only a charade.



Words don't always have to be uttered that way. For instance, in John 14 when Jesus is speaking to His disciples, they are spoken out of care and concern. His disciples are seeking to know the truth and to follow the correct path. Jesus is promising to send the Holy Spirit to them as their counselor and guide.

The assumption is that Jesus' disciples DO in fact love Him and desire the godly path. He is simply instructing them that this means doing what He has commanded them. St John informs us that God is in fact the very definition of love and sent His only Son Jesus out of His unending love for you and for me. He has saved us. We have no need to fear sin, death, or the devil. Instead we can walk in love. That is what He instructs.

As you go out and interact with others, your life should in fact reflect the love that Christ has for you. You should follow God's command to love one another as you love yourself. As you make your way into 2017, ask yourself if your life reflects this.

Last week as I was working in the yard, I noticed the sound of a chainsaw. I went to the fence and saw my neighbor diligently laboring to cut away the rather large and cumbersome remains of the tree that once dominated his backyard. He was by himself and working with an undersized and underpowered chainsaw that would take him many afternoons to be rid of the unwanted obstacle. I went over to see if I could lend a hand.



It is an ancient custom in the Christian church that a "Farewell to Alleluia" be sung at the close of the last Divine Service on the Sunday before Ash Wednesday (Transfiguration Sunday). Traditionally "alleluia" is not sung again in Divine Service until Easter Sunday, symbolizing our voluntary restraint of praise during the penitential season of Lent. In our *Lutheran Service Book* we have #417 "Alleluia, Song of Gladness," which is the last Transfiguration hymn before the section on Lent.

> Alleluia, song of gladness, Voice of joy that cannot die; Alleluia is the anthem Ever raised by choirs on high; In the house of God abiding Thus they sing eternally.

The text comes from the 11th century, and was translated by John Mason Neale (1818-1861). The hymnal melody is "Lauda anima," which is in a major (joyful) key. The melody often used by this hymn in choral arrangement is "Picardy," a 17th century French tune which is in a minor (mournful) key.

> Alleluia, thou resounds, True Jerusalem and free; Alleluia, joyful mother, All the children sing with thee, But by Babylon's sad waters Mourning exiles now are we.

As stated in Psalm 137:1 "By the rivers of Babylon we [the Israelites] sat and wept when we remembered Zion," and v.4 "How can we sing the songs of the Lord while in a foreign land?" We Christians are also mourning exiles in this foreign land (earth) who long to be in our heavenly home, heavenly Jerusalem, here referred to as "joyful mother." *(NIV)*

Alleluia cannot always Be our song while here below; Alleluia, our transgressions Make us for a while forgo; For the solemn time is coming When our tears for sin must flow.

We would like life to always be happy and joyful, full of alleluias, but because of our sinful nature, we also must deal with the pain and sorrow of our sinful nature, and turn to repentance.

Therefore in our hymns we pray Thee, Grant us blessed Trinity, At the last to keep Thine Easter With the faithful saints on high; There to Thee forever singing Alleluia joyfully.

We pray that God would keep us faithful unto death so that we might join the great multitude in heaven shouting "Alleluia!"

Focus on Stewardship

We've all heard that stewardship is giving to the church of our time, talents, and treasure. This alliterative trinity helps us see that giving is not just about money, but about our whole lives. For God has given us everything we have and enjoy as we confess in the meaning to the First Article of the Apostle's Creed. And what we confess first among those is that God gives us "our body and soul, our eyes, ears, and all our members, our reason and all our senses." Only then do we confess that he gives us material things. Thus the time, talents, and treasure trinity places before our eyes the fact that we are to give something of all of these things toward the mission of the church in thanksgiving for what God has provided. For everything we have and indeed everything we are comes from God's fatherly divine goodness and mercy.

The problem with this alliterative trinity comes when we replace one little word with another little word—when we replace the word *and* with the word *or*. It is always written with the *and*, but when we read it, we read it with the *or*. Thus this quite helpful trinity, which extolled that everything that we have and are is a gift from God and which is to be pressed into the service of God in His church, turns into a trinity that we can pick and choose which of the trinity we use into the service of God. The giving of our time, talents, *and* treasure turns into the giving of our time, talents, *or* treasure. Then the question arises: Can we give of our time and talents instead of our treasures? Or perhaps it is the other way around: Can we give our treasure and not of our time and our talents? But these are the wrong questions. The right question is, can we give of our time and our talents in addition to our treasure? Yes, indeed, we are called to give of all three. The things that God gives us are not to be pitted against one another. They are given to us and we are to press them all into God's service for benefit of His church and our neighbors in need.

Thus we give all three. We give our treasure in the form of a generous, first-fruits, proportion of our income. We give of our time in generosity for the benefit of Christ's holy church. We give of our talents in the same manner. Since God gave us all these things, we are called to give generously of all these things in faith toward Him and in fervent love to our neighbors.

For God has provided all these things to us. Out of His fatherly, divine goodness and mercy, He gives us each time, talents, AND treasures as a means to bless those around us. We serve our neighbors with these things, blessing them with the blessings in which God has blessed us. We give of our time, talents, and treasures to our families, our society, and to our church, our local congregations. And we do this because we know that we are not our own. Rather, we belong to God. We have been bought with a price—with the holy precious blood and innocent suffering and death of our Lord Jesus Christ. He gave everything—His time, His talents, and His treasure,—to have us as His own and to live under Him in His

Mission Work Updates

Music Camp for Advent/Christmas. With the addition of Tyler McMiller and Vicar Paul Flo to our team in Santo Domingo, we now have two excellent guitar instructors. We decided to offer music camps for our youth (the primary musicians in our churches here) to prepare for the music of the season, but also to promote fellowship among the youth from all of our DR congregations. We gathered one Friday/Saturday at the seminary in Palmar Arriba amidst torrential rains. We opened with Matins and closed with a service of lessons and carols.

Forming Pastors in the Dominican. We continue to have a pre-seminary Bible study once a month at the seminary in Palmar Arriba. I usually drive about six or seven boys up to Palmar (2 1/2 hour drive) the first Friday of the month. The goal is to have the boys read as much Scripture as possible, with a bit of commentary along the way. We arrive in the evening, study for two hours and close with a meal. Our Santo Domingo group spends the night, then we head home Saturday morning.

Next fall, we plan to begin formal courses at our Dominican seminary. Construction for classrooms and a library is under way. Stay tuned!


