Running with Endurance

In the past two years I have taken quite a renewed interest in physical fitness. I try to watch what I eat, when I eat, and make sure I'm physically active every day. (Hebrews 12:1-2).

We don't make an intentional decision to let it become inactive, but little decision by little decision we fall into a less and less active faith life and soon we are spiritually out of shape. This race is no less important than any physical race; our eternal fate rests in the balance.

It may not seem so important day to day, but just like preparing for a 5K, training and preparation count. Remember to immerse yourself into the body of believers. Run with other runners. Pray with other believers. Let yourselves be built up by one another.

Theology of Worship

Recently our Sunday morning Adult Bible Class has been discussing liturgy and worship. We like to call our Sunday morning church service a "worship service," but there is so much more happening on Sunday than us just praising our Triune God. That makes it seem as if we are there to do the work, from us to God.

When Jesus walked on earth, He did not do it just so that people would give Him praise and glory. He came to serve and heal people, to give His life for them. So God comes to us on Sunday morning to give us the gifts of His Word and Sacraments. He speaks to us and we respond in faith and devotion. He is acting. We are receiving. He gives us faith as a gift. We do nothing but be there to receive it. So we properly call our service the Divine Service. God serving us again and again.

The rhythm of our Evangelical Lutheran worship is from God to us, and then from us back to God. Do you hear God speaking to you on Sunday morning? I hope so. He speaks through His Word, the Scripture readings. He also is speaking to us through our pastors, Pastor King and Pastor Perez. In Divine Service when we see our pastor facing us, talking to us, it is God speaking through him to us. Then the pastor faces the altar with us as we acknowledge God's gifts and receive them. Our worship is centered on God, specifically on Jesus Christ (Christocentric). That is the first aspect of worship.

The second aspect of worship is that we are there as members of the body of Christ, the church, the community of saints. We proclaim to each other, and to the world, that the kingdom of God in Jesus Christ is present among us. This happens right now in real time, but also beyond time and space as we join "with angels and archangels and all the company of heaven" (all the saints who have gone before us).

So it matters what I do in my faith life now. I do not live in a vacuum. I do not worship in a vacuum. I am a member of the body of Christ and the community of saints. It matters to those gone before me to keep the faith. And it matters to those who are coming after that I pass on the true faith that the real presence of Christ is moving into the lives of people and changing them through the Gospel. This is what is happening in church on Sunday morning!

Focus on Stewardship

"It is more blessed to give than to receive," said St. Paul, quoting our Lord (Acts 20:35). How can this be?

Jesus and His disciples withdrew to a mountain by the shore of the Sea of Galilee. The crowds followed them, for the Lord had just showered upon them the gift of His teaching, the gift of His Word. But the day was waning; the sun was setting, and it was getting late. Looking upon the crowds, Jesus had compassion on them and asked, "Where are we to buy bread, so that these people may eat" (John 6:5)? Philip said that two hundred denarii (a day's wages for two hundred men) could not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little.

But Andrew, Peter's brother, brought a young boy forward, who had five barley loaves and two small fish. "But," Andrew asked, "what are they for so many" (John 6:9). Jesus replied, "Have the people sit down" (John 6:10).

Then Jesus, the Son of God, gave them a second gift, a gift from what only He could give—a gift from above. He took the bread and the fish, gave thanks, blessed them, and distributed them to the crowd. Then came the miracle. As these five loaves and two fish were given out, they multiplied. He fed the hungry

crowd until they were all full. And twelve baskets full were left over.

But Jesus was not the only one who gave that day. There is one person who also gave from what he had. It was the boy with the five loaves and the two fish. All the others, including the boy, received the gift of a miraculous feast. And they would look back on it with wonder. But the boy, when he would look back on it, would look back and remember not just what he received. He would look back with wonder and delight when the Son of God made his gift into something miraculous. For it is more blessed to give than to receive.

This our Lord does for each of us. He presses our gifts, no matter how big or how small, into His service and works wonders with them. He provides through what we give: water for baptism, bread and wine for the Lord's Supper, a man called and sent for the preaching of the Gospel and Absolution. He provides a building in which we can gather as His children, lights so that we might not gather in darkness. He provides funds for the care of the poor and struggling, for missionaries who preach and teach beyond our borders. He makes Christians, disciples of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ in our midst by bringing them to faith and nurturing them in that faith. He takes our gifts and turns them into something miraculous.

Indeed, it is more blessed to give than to receive. Thus we give. We give of what we have. And the Lord works His wonders.

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
