1 Peter 2:9 "But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for his own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light."

Happy New Year to all, and pray for a blessed new beginning. 2014 is gone, but even in January 2015, I'm still hearing "Thank you" from the members and friends whose homes we visited in December.

On December 14th a group of members went to sing Christmas carols at the homes of ECE families who had requested a visit; I was unable to participate in that event.

On December 21st, another group visited the homes of Immanuel shut-in members. Four cars of 12 children and adults enjoyed very pleasant weather that afternoon. I provided our Church Secretary the addresses of those we would visit and I also notified our shut-ins of our intention to visit. Our Secretary printed out a map of the locations, so it was not difficult to find them. We began in the Timbergrove subdivision, and then went out towards Brookwoods Street. We also visited the Brookdale-Heights Senior Living Home, and sang for two Immanuel members there. We visited a total of 9 homes and 15 members.

The children were very excited by the song sheets, and by the goody bags to be given out to each shut-in. As we sang the Christmas carols, I noticed that the eyes of our shut-ins seemed to be dancing with joy, especially as they watched the children sing. The children stole the show as they took turns distributing the goody bags. On my return home, I received two phone calls giving me thanks for bringing the group to their homes. I regret that we were not able to visit three other locations because of the distance from our route.

The joy that these shut-ins received can be an ongoing thing – you can call them by phone, or send a birthday card or a note of friendship or encouragement. Let's not forget them.

Focus on Stewardship

"Be merciful as your Father in heaven is merciful" (Luke 6:36). The word for mercy that Jesus uses here has a more concrete meaning than what we typically associate with mercy. It means more than just being kind. It means to be concerned about your neighbor's state and well-being. Thus, Jesus taught that we are to care, to be concerned about our neighbor's state and well-being even as our Father in heaven cares for and is concerned about our state and well-being.

How has our Father in heaven cared for our state? How has He shown His concern for our well-being? How has He showered this mercy upon us?

He gave of Himself. He sent His only-begotten Son in human flesh, to become one of us-a man-and to suffer all that we suffer and to endure what we endure-a fallen world full of sinful people, temptation, the attacks of the devil, and death. He took upon Himself what rightfully belongs to us-sin and death-in order that He could give to us what rightfully belongs to Him—righteousness, purity, eternal life, and victory over the temptation of Satan and this fallen world. That is how He cared for our state. That is how He was concerned for our well-being. He entered into our state for the sake of our well-being, died in our place, rose for our justification, redeemed us to make all things new. He entered our state so that by

water and His Word we would be granted entrance into His state as children of our Father in heaven. In other words, He had empathy toward us, which resulted in true sympathy.

Jesus, therefore, calls the church to empathy and sympathy for her neighbors. "Be merciful even as your Father in heaven is merciful." He asks the church to give of herself, to enter into her neighbors' state for their well-being. And the church gives of herself the only thing in her that is worth giving. As the Body of Christ, she gives Christ to her neighbors. She gives out the same mercy that she has received. She gives the mercy that the heavenly Father poured out upon her through the sending of His Son. And she does it through the preaching of the forgiveness of sins in Word and Deed, in Word and Sacrament. For this is how the church lives—in the forgiveness of sins received in the means of grace—and, therefore, this is what the church does. What else can she do?

And since this is how the church lives and what the church does, this is likewise how Christians live and what Christians do. That is why giving to the church is so important. It ensures that the proclamation of the forgiveness of sins in Word and Deed continues. It ensures that our neighbors' state and well-being is cared for and attended to. It ensures that our neighbors have access to our heavenly Father's mercy just as we have received it here in time for all eternity.

Therefore, I say, let us be merciful even as our Father in heaven is merciful.

I have a friend who is battling cancer. His name is Darrell, and he has incredible faith in the love and power of God in the face of monumental odds. He is a prayer warrior. He is also an inspiration. I'd like to share with you a recent post he made on Facebook. I hope it lifts your heart as much as it did mine.

"I thought I'd start out the new year with a post for my new FB friends that have recently been diagnosed or had a recurrence of cancer. One of the battles we fight is fear. But take heart; if you are a Christian, you have nothing to fear.

We all have fears. For a cancer patient, fighting fear is a daily battle. Is my tumor growing? Is the chemo working? What will the scans show on my next doctor visit? Will I be cured? Will I live a long life? Will I make it next year? Will I make it through Christmas? Will my family be ok without me?

But, cancer patients aren't the only ones fighting fear. Will I be able to make my house note? Will I lose my job? My business does little more than cover the expenses. Will it survive? Will my marriage survive? My relationship with my child is broken. My relationship with my parents is broken. I'm single, and I may never find someone. I'm alone.

In what kind of belief system are you living? As a Christian, we profess to believe in Christ. Do my actions show that, or am I living in a Fear Belief System? Pessimism... Pride... Selfishness... Self-Pity... Sadness... Guilt... Despair... Anger... All

are evidence you are living in a Fear-Based Belief System. Friends, this is not from God.

The Bible tells us what is a Christ-Based Belief System. 'For God has not given us a spirit of fearfulness, but one of power, love, and sound judgment.' (2 Timothy 1:7 HCSB). So, with that spirit God has given us, we are to face our fears with power, with authority from the Almighty. We are to face that broken relationship with the love Christ gives us. We are to use the sound judgment from God to handle the business and job situation.

When we live in that Christ Belief System, we are saying we believe Christ will supply ALL of our needs. The evidence of that Spirit given to us will NOT be the anger, pessimism, pride, selfishness, and such. The evidence of the Spirit when we are living a Christ Belief System life are Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness, and Self-Control.

When fear arises in our lives, we must replace that fear with the Hope, and Belief, that God loves us, and He will supply all of our needs. That even if that tumor grows, that job is lost, that business fails, that relationship breaks, God will be there at the very point of our need and supply us all we need with Mercy, and Compassion, and Love. The thought of that will put a permanent smile on your face. The next time fear crops its head, replace it with the Christ Belief System life. Now THAT is living a radical life for Christ.

Take it from a cancer patient, that's a lesson hard-learned!"

Martin Luther's Catechism Hymns – Baptism

"To Jordan Came the Christ, Our Lord," *Lutheran Service Book* #406, is Martin Luther's hymn on the Sacrament of Baptism. It is noted underneath this hymn "In his catechism hymn on Baptism Luther uses the Biblical narrative of Jesus' baptism to teach the meaning of Baptism for our lives."

Why did Jesus need to be baptized? Not because He had sins of His own, but because He had our sins. Jesus entered baptism with no sin. He left with our sin. He took to himself the sin of the entire world. "For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God." (2 Cor. 5:21) The justice of God requires the punishment of sin. When John baptized Jesus, God placed our sin on Jesus. Jesus, in turn, carried those sins to the cross. There on the cross Jesus satisfied both God's justice and His love. God's justice was satisfied by punishing our sin IN Jesus Christ. God's love was satisfied by punishing Jesus Christ instead of us. In this way, God punished our sin without punishing us.

What does this mean for our baptism? The Holy Spirit inspired St. Paul to answer that all of us who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into His death. (Romans 6:4) These words teach us that through baptism we share all things with Christ Jesus. In the eyes of God's justice, Christ's punishment is our punishment. Christ's death is our death. And through baptism we share in the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Baptism, as a Means of Grace, takes the forgiveness that Jesus earned for us on the cross and delivers that forgiveness to us to be received by faith. This all happens through grace, God's love for us undeserving sinners, not through any work or action on our part. That is why Lutherans can baptize even tiny babies in full confidence of God's promises, because the saving work is done completely by our loving God, and nothing needs to be done by us. God's promises are forgiveness, life, and salvation. "He saved us through the washing of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit, whom He poured out on us generously through Jesus Christ our Savior, so that having been justified by His grace, we might become heirs having the hope of eternal life." (Titus 3:5-8)

Why is baptism considered a sacrament? Because at the command of Christ himself, washing with water (a physical element) is combined with God's Word. "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." (Matt. 28:19) In this washing, we are reborn and made new through the Holy Spirit. Our sins are forgiven, we are rescued from death and the devil, and we are promised eternal life.

Jesus' baptism was also a manifestation of the Triune God. The heavens opened and the Holy Spirit descended on Jesus. God the Father expressed His pleasure with the words, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased." In this grand epiphany, the Father and the Spirit show us that Jesus is indeed the Son of God who has come into the world in order to save it from sin.

February 21 is when everything becomes new, at least for the Fritsche family. That's our departure date for our new life in the Dominican Republic. On December 16 we received the green light for deployment. Ever since then we've been pressing on toward that newness. The old is passing away as we sell things, give things away and throw a lot away.

We are super excited as we press on toward a new culture, new language, new people, new home, new colleagues and more. We'll be living in Santo Domingo, the capital city of the DR, also the oldest European settled city in the Americas. But as old as the city is, it will be completely new to us.

As God's child in Christ, you are a new creation. St. Paul says that the *"old has passed away; behold, the new has come" (2 Cor. 5:17).* That's good news for you. Leave behind your sin. Christ died for it and has taken it away, leaving it buried. Leave behind your pain and sadness of the past. Christ has made you new in the waters of Holy Baptism and raised you to a whole new life. And that is super exciting!

We struggle to let go of the old, whether we're speaking about missionaries moving to a new place of service or Christians living new lives in

Christ. The battle with the Old Adam rages on each day. We grapple with sins old and new. We contend with sufferings past and present. Americans, Dominicans, sure there are different contexts, unique trials and temptations, but it all boils down to the same Old Adam deceiving and destroying. But your Baptism into Christ is more than some old event in the past. It's a present reality, a daily reality of being made new in Christ. The Gospel is always new. The Lord's mercies are new every morning. Every time you hear His absolution, you return to the new life given you in Holy Baptism. Every time you receive Christ's body and blood, you're nourished in that new life. The Old Adam is put to death and a new creation is raised with Christ!

You are God's new creation in Christ. You have a green light. Press on in your new life. Revel in Christ's mercy as you receive it and share it with others. Behold, He makes all things new!

Hymn on Baptism . . .

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"To Jordan Came the Christ our Lord" first appeared in 1541. It was translated into English by Elizabeth Quitmeyer (1911-88) at the request of Carl Schalk and was first used in the *Lutheran Book of Worship*. The melody, "Christ Unser Herr," was first published in Johann Walther's *Geystliche gesangk Buchleyn* in 1524. It may be an original Luther melody.


