## Hot and Cold

## Looking Back

I had a limited duty, preach once each month and report to the Elders on my visits.

Then followed the closing of our parochial school, which was clearly a necessity, even with all the refurbishing of the school area and the publicity that was put out. Then another surprise, our principal left, which members could not understand. I was left to carry the church and pastoral duties. I thank the Lord for all the help from the Elders and individual members. Retired ministers were contacted to hold services on the Sundays I was not preaching. I kept busy with hospital calls, baptisms, weddings, meetings and also finished up the last school confirmation class. We contacted District and they asked for a study of our congregation, followed with interim pastors and now a senior pastor.

But, there are many faithful members that are unsung. I think of the lady who sits before a computer with a stack of cards. She records the people present on Sunday, plus pulls out the visitors. How long has she been doing this?

Our church and ECE secretaries, have their regular duties, but are always willing to go the extra mile to be of service to you. The church secretary fills vases with flowers left over from the Sunday services for me to take and surprise our homebound members. The ECE secretary is often there when I call late in the afternoon, and she answers my questions about finding members' homes or what hospital calls I need to make. There are times when she will ask me to visit ECE parents in the hospitals.

We have greeters present nearly every Sunday morning who welcome you and ask visitors for their names and addresses to record on our visitation book.

Have you ever noticed the flags on our parking lot? Who puts them up every Sunday? Oh, it may be a trustee, for which we ought to be thankful.

Then the Altar Guild, what a job they do, and they are organized so well.

The members who have the big jobs of hanging the banners and placing the black or white drapes on the cross for the Lent and Easter seasons.

Let me never forget the ones in the balcony who run the PowerPoint and audio system.

I mention all these things because I was raised in a mission congregation where almost all of these duties were done by the Pastor. If there are others who I have missed, please forgive me. Thank you, those who show your love for Immanuel by your deeds, may the Lord bless you!

Some may fall away because they may not find worship innovative and stimulating enough. Yes, worship is not intended or designed to be "entertainment." It is designed to deliver God's Word and His gift of forgiveness and renewal. Hollywood does a great job of entertaining those who have no vested interest. But for the concerned, interest is determined by the subject rather than the venue or style.

Some may fall away because of the pull of other activities, and they may have convinced themselves that

they can commune with God just as well in front of the television, in the sports stadium, or in a deer stand. Absolutely not. Yes, God is present in all those places, but He promises to give His blessings through His Word and Sacraments. Do you hear the Bible read in the boat at the lake? He promises to be active in our lives when we gather together around His Name and we listen.

The list of excuses is virtually inexhaustible. Satan can always find more distractions to tempt us. Have you let your soul slide out of the direct contact of the Holy Spirit's fire of His Saints gathered in worship? I pray you look at this area of your lives with fresh eyes. It was very wonderful to have some family time as the boys were off of school and Joel's parents joined us for the holidays. We were incredibly blessed to be able to travel to Punta Cana and the Samana province.

The boys are more than ready to get back to school and friends. Joel is preparing for a week-long trip for a symposium in Fort Wayne. A great beginning to the year! How blessed we have been! 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# Travel Beyond This Point Not Recommended

In John 16:33, Jesus says, "In this world you will have trouble."

Living in Tok, AK has brought a whole new world of difficulties to our family. The beauty of this area is absolutely stunning. That is a major reason many people move to this area. The extreme difficulty of surviving in this environment often sends many back home within a year or two. While these hardships are new to our family, for many of the people living here the hardships of surviving just south of the Arctic Circle have lasted a lifetime.

The strength and resilience of the Indians who have lived in this area for centuries is impressive. Their quiet acceptance of such a harsh fight for survival is simply part of who they are and many feel blessed to have been born into such a life.



Every so often I drive past the sign in the picture. As I do, I run through a mental checklist of everything I have in the vehicle with me. I also wonder how much Christians in the United States are truly prepared to travel

the road of life with Christ? Have we rightly prepared for what lies ahead? Or do we have some idealistic view of what we think life in Christ should be? Or that somehow we can avoid the troubles that come with living in a sinful world?

Alongside the signs that say "Know Christ, Know Peace!" should we maybe post warning signs such as "Know Christ, Know Trouble?" There are a whole host of signs we could come up with, "The easy road is the wrong road!," "Smooth Sailing = Deadly Seas."

Over and over again the Scriptures are clear... following Christ leads to a difficult life in this world. Just check out the end of the Beatitudes in Jesus' Sermon on the Mount. The Revelation was given to John to encourage the churches through the suffering that was upon them. How greatly the comfort of the Gospel must have spoken to the early Christians who saw so much persecution (whose lives were in constant danger), all because they followed Christ!

People who are in the midst of great suffering are often well prepared to hear the true sweetness of the Gospel. The suffering may be self-imposed such as the woman at the well (*John 4*), physical (any of Jesus' healings) or spiritual like the demon-possessed man (*Mark 5*). And while some may be tempted to think all went well in life for those Jesus healed, don't forget: these people too would be hated and persecuted by Jews and Romans alike. Many would flee their homes, others would be tortured and killed. Life for early Christians after Jesus ascended was anything but peace and happiness. But they did not lose faith. Jesus had prepared them for such a life.

Nothing about the Christian life is "easy." It might be something small, like being late to an appointment to help someone in need, or something bigger like not taking that dream vacation because a family member's health has deteriorated. The struggle may be to serve

someone who only seems to take from you or forgive an enemy who still intends to hurt you. It could also involve going on that mission trip that doesn't really fit into your life's schedule. Nothing about loving others more than yourself is easy! If it was it wouldn't have taken God sending His perfect Son to love you more than He loved Himself. He gave himself up for you even while you were still His enemy! (*Romans 5:10*). We will suffer only for a time, but Jesus suffered an eternity of hell to pay the debt we owe. In doing so He declares to us, "Take heart! I have overcome the world." (*John 16:33*). This world is a valley of the shadow of death, but through Christ his goodness and mercy follow us all the days of our lives and we will dwell in the house of the Lord forever!" (*Psalms 23*).

Looking at giving in this light makes it a joy to give. The joy is multiplied. There is joy in you because you have served your neighbor in his need. There is joy in your neighbor for God has answered their prayers through you. And God rejoices and is pleased with it all. It might just make the humdrum of grocery shopping and mortgage payments a bit more joyous. It might even make April 15 tolerable (St. Paul had to have this pep talk with the Romans, also, "This is why you pay taxes...." *Romans 13:6*). And it surely will make the envelope placed into the offering plate a joyful thing.

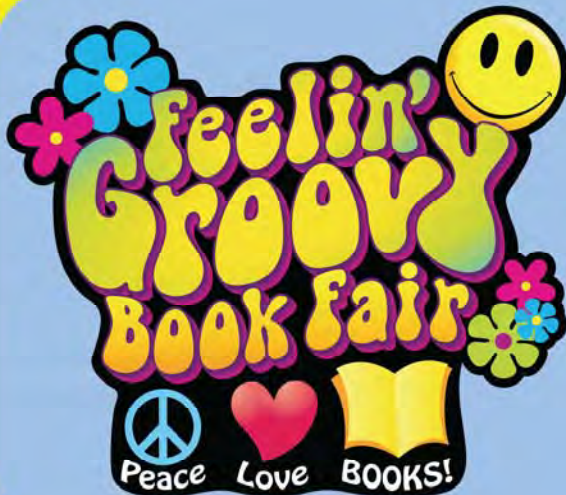
